

# How to use the Scotland's People website for your Scottish Research - and when not to!

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


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#### **Abstract**

• The Scotland's People website is the only place you can see the images of Scottish records such as Old Parish Records and Statutory Records (which provide you with dates for births, baptisms, marriages and death) and Scottish Census returns where you can learn about the familial relationships of people who lived in the same households and start to put together a picture of your ancestral families. Scotland's People is a pay-per-records website and you can find yourself spending a lot of money on the website. In this presentation we will look at how to use the Scotland's People website search facilities, but also we will discuss when it is prudent not to spend money on the website and look elsewhere for transcriptions.



#### Create a user id

- However you intend to use the Scotland's People website, you will need to create
  yourself a login user id. Even if you just want to make use of the free indexes, you will
  still need one.
- This is easy to obtain, so long as you have an email address. In the top right corner of the website, you have choice to Login or Register. If you don't yet have a user id, click on Register the first time you visit and fill in the fields.


## Log in

• Once you have your user id, you can get logged into the website and start searching.

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




#### Let' Search!

- We're going to use my great-grandfather as an example to search for. From census records that I have found through Ancestry, I know he was born around 1838 in Unst, Shetland, and I have found him in census transcriptions up to 1901. His wife shows up in the census in 1871 suggesting they married between 1861 and 1871
- We're going to see if we can find his birth and marriage records. Helpfully these will illustrate the difference between pre-1855 Old Parish Records, and post-1855 Statutory Records.




## Front Page or Advanced Search?

- While it is possible to use Scotland's People to do a wide-ranging search by filling in the search boxes on the front page, I would argue that when you come to the Scotland's People website, you are after something a bit more specific.
- I always go straight into the "Advanced people search" so that I can add more details to my search, and I know exactly what kind of records I want to look for.
- If you do not have a specific record in mind that you are trying to find, you could
  waste money looking at images of records that are not for your ancestors. Use the
  library access to things like Ancestry and Find My Past to narrow down your search
  criteria using census records transcriptions are an excellent resource to use for this
  and are how I found the details just mentioned about my great-great-grandfather.

### Advanced Search - Categories

- When you select Advanced Search you are presented with several categories to choose from, since you are doing a more directed search. These categories are all the different types of records you can search.
- We are looking for a birth and marriage record, so we need to either look in the Statutory registers or the Church Registers. Which should we choose? Well the answer to that depends on whether the year we are aiming for is before or after 1855.



- Statutory Registration began
  - Replacing the previous Old Parish Records
    - Records kept by Church of Scotland session clerks
    - Method failing due to population migration to the cities, and ministers and session clerks no longer having a good knowledge of their parishioners.

Search church registers of births (or baptisms), marriages and burials in Scotland from 1553

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


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### What happened in 1855?

- 1855 was the year that Statutory Registration of births, deaths and marriages began in Scotland after the 1854 Registration Act was finally passed.
- This replaced the previous mechanism which was records kept by Church of Scotland session clerks now commonly referred to as the Old Parish Records.
- "After 1800, the industrialisation of Scotland proceeded apace, and with that huge migrations of the population from rural parishes to the larger burghs. In particular, the cities became urban conurbations, with the poorer classes crammed into insanitary tenements. In the countryside, the parish system still worked, but in the slums of the cities the ministers and the session clerks lost control of and often did not know their parishioners." \*
- If the date of the event you are searching for is pre-1855 you need to look in the "Church registers" section, and if 1855 onwards, you need to look in the "Statutory registers" section. You also need to bear in mind that if the date is pre-1855 and the parish is an urban one, you may find that registration simply hadn't happened and no record can be found.

#### Searching for ~1838 Birth

If you recall, my great-great-grandfather was born around 1838 according to the
census records found for him. Therefore we need to be looking in the pre-1855
Church registers. So we'll select that, and then below we are offered a further choice.
We want to search for a birth record so we choose "Births and baptisms".

#### Fill in Search Criteria

- Fill in as much as you know in the search boxes.
- Here I have filled in the surname "Hughson" and forename "John" and I have selected Male. There are search options for each of the name fields and clicking on the "Search Options" text to the right of the name entry box will bring up a small blue menu where you can select different options. The default if you don't change anything is "Exact names only" for the surname field, and "Names that begin with" for the forename field – helpful if there are middle names that you are not aware of.
- Even though I am fairly certain of the year of birth because, unusually, all the census returns seem to agree, I have still added 3 years to either side of my expected birth year.
- Finally, I know from census returns that John was born in Unst, but after choosing the county as Shetland, and waiting a moment for the website to distil which parishes are in Shetland, I choose to select the three neighbouring parishes of Fetlar, North Yell and Unst in the parish box, just in case.



## Results

- Here are my search results. I have two hits, and the first one is from the parish of Unst. I already know from the 1851 and 1861 census where John was still living with his parents, that his father's name is James, so I am very confident that the first result is the one I am after.
- This is the free index into the records, I have not yet paid for anything here.
- On the right of the result, there is a blue "View image" button. If you have already
  purchased the image, the button will instead show a green "View image" button. So
  long as you continue to use the same user id you won't pay for the same record more
  than once.




#### **Credits**

- Let's talk about credits in the Scotland's People website.
- In order to view an image, you must pay 6 credits (£1.50) . To buy credits, you click on the Buy Credits link which is at the top of many of the pages, one example is at the top of the "Advanced Search" page where we chose categories to search earlier.
- There are several packages of credits that you can buy. There is no advantage to buying large numbers, the credits are always the same price. I credit costs £0.25 however you purchase it. Don't buy too many as they do expire after two years if you haven't bought any more in that time. So long as you buy some within the two years, your old ones will not expire.
- When you are logged into the Scotland's People website, the top right corner shows your name and how many credits are currently in your account.



- View any previously purchased images
- Add descriptions to them to help remember what they are
- Use the filter to find images by their record header or your description
  - Handy if you have a lot of them!

#### Previously viewed images

- As noted already, if you have previously purchased an image, you will not have to pay
  for it again it you run a search where the results are something you have previously
  bought it will show that by displaying the different "View" button as we just saw.
- In addition, at any time you can look at your set of purchased images from the top bar
  of the website, by clicking on "Saved images".



## Value for money?

- Now that you know how to spend money on credits for the Scotland's People website, let's see whether that money is worth spending. Purchasing the record we just searched for results in obtaining a single page from the Unst Parish, Births & Baptisms Old Parish Record.
- Let's look at the lines on that page that are specifically for our John Hughson.

#### Compare to Index

- The question here is whether it was worth spending 6 credits to purchase that image, or were we as well just to stick with the data from the index. Here we compare the two.
- The index only reports one date, and we have a record here that gives two dates the birth and baptism date. Many (most?) baptism records don't give the birth date. The index also doesn't tell us the place of residence "Colvadale", but that might be more detail than some want to discover anyway. You know that the baptism took place in the parish of Unst, and that might be enough of a location for many people.
- Transcriptions of Old Parish Records are also available on the various subscriptions sites that you can access free in your library. Here is the transcription from Ancestry. It shows both dates, but again omits the place of residence.
- It was probably not worth the credits to purchase this record.
- Both indexes also show some information that is NOT in the record, they show the surname of the child, but they have made an assumption in doing this that the child will have the same surname as the father, and this is not always the case.

- The child in the above record might have been known as John Jameson – patronymic surname
- Searching for John Jameson would not find this record
  - It is indexed as John Hughson
- Try searches without surname
- Extra reading material for patronymic puzzles I've solved.

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#### Child's Surname

- Please keep in mind the era you are searching in and the use of patronymic surnames.
   What is not clear from either the Scotland's People Index record or the Ancestry
   Transcription, is that the boy's surname is not actually recorded as Hughson! All the
   record actually says is that James Hughson had a son called John. It does not say he had
   a son called John Hughson. Both transcriptions have made the assumption that the
   child's surname is the same as the parent.
- This is not always the case.
- Patronymic surnames are where the child's surname is made up from the first name of the father (or mother in some countries still today) followed by "son" (or sometimes "dottir". Patronymics were still in use in Scotland in the early 1800s so take care. If you fail to find what you are looking for you can change your search criteria, omitting the surname for example you will of course get more results returned!

#### Tracking Martha Johnson

I was contacted through this blog by the great-great-grandson of Martha. He was looking for information on her birth and death details.

#### Birth

We knew from her marriage record to Donald Sutherland on 23 Jan 1840 that her maiden name is Martha Johnson, and that she lived in Ungersta. Interestingly, on her son James's marriage record she is recorded as Martha Jamieson. Being a little less specific about her surname and searching for Martha J\* soon reveals the following record in the Old Parish Records of Births and Baptisms in Unst.

Seeing this record explains the discrepancy and also the difficulty in finding it. This is a common problem with patronymic surnames, since that record is indexed as Martha Jameson, not Johnson as she was actually known.

#### Death

Finding her death record was a little more difficult however. From census returns we know she died between 1861 and 1871 since in 1861 she is in Unst with her family, but in 1871 she is nowhere to be found and her husband, who is still living in Skaw, is recorded as Widowed. She didn't die in Unst though as there is no sign of her in the Unst death records.

So, since I was in Edinburgh at the ScotlandsPeople Centre I had a thorough look at all the Martha's who died anywhere in Shetland between 1861 and 1871, still no sign. Expanding my search for Martha Sutherland's in the whole of Scotland I found one possibility, a married woman called Martha Sutherland who died in The Sunnyside Lunatic Asylum in Montrose – a long way from Unst!

The informant didn't know enough about her, or didn't bother to find out enough, to fill in her husband's name, which is usually recorded below the word *Married*, nor her parents names. So, this **could** be her, but equally it could be anyone.

Upstairs in Register House, above the ScotlandsPeople search rooms, is the Historical Records search room, so I looked for admission records for the *Sunnyside hospital* in their catalog index. I found them, but they are not digitised, and they are stored in the University of Dundee Archives. I was ready to pop over to Dundee the following day to get a look at them, only to discover that Thursday (the last day of my visit to Scotland this time) was the day their archives are closed! I definitely had a "so near, and yet so far" feeling then.

So, I emailed the Dundee Archives in the hope that they could look up the Admission records and find the Martha Sutherland who died in the Hospital and see if there was any additional information recorded that would refute or prove that she was the one we were looking for. I wasn't sure how well indexed such records were, whether looking one person up, even with such a narrow date window (1861 – 1867), would mean literally turning every page.

Well, I was very pleasantly surprised. It was an easy look up for the archivist to do, and by the time I left Register House on Thursday aftenoon (where there is no internet access) and could read my email for the day, I had a response from them with the details from the Hospital Records. It was a woman from Unst, with a husband Donald Sutherland who lived in Skaw. It was our girl! She checked into the Hospital on 9 January 1865, at age 48. It was recorded as her third attack, the first being when she was 36 years of age.

The record also shed some light on why she was there. It records the Supposed Cause as "Death of an infant from being overlaid and death of a child thereafter from burning."

It just shows that it really is worth following every possible lead, even if you don't think it's likely that someone would be so far from home when they died, Unst to Montrose is quite a long way from home.

I'd like to try and find the children who died but that will be the subject of a future blog post.

#### Tracking Thomas Johnson

I can't resist a puzzle, and when someone posted a question about an Unst ancestor in the Shetland Genealogy Facebook Group, I couldn't resist taking a closer look. Their 4th Great-Grandparents were John Thomason and Barbara Jane Winwick who I had in the Unst Family Tree already, and they were trying to determine John's parents. John died on 8 April 1847 which is before 1855 and thus part of the Old Parish Records which means that no parents of the deceased are recorded.

She had found a John Thomason born to parents Thomas Johnson and Ann Williamson, and wondered whether that John could be the same one.

Thomas Johnson from Unst, and Ann Williamson from Yell (the neighbouring island) were married in Unst on 29 November 1801. From the Old Parish Record of their marriage contract we also know that Thomas was from Clipragrath.

Ann Williamson/Johnson can be found in the 1841 and 1851 census returns living with her daughter Mary. She is recorded as a widow in the 1851 census, and was likely a widow in 1841 as well, but that early census does not record such data. To double check this is the same Ann Williamson, I found her daughter Mary's death record in Unst on 10 July 1877 which shows her parents to be Thomas Johnson and Ann Williamson. So we have the correct person here. Finding all the siblings seemed to be the right thing to follow.

Looking through the Unst Old Parish Baptism Records from 1800 until 1823 (starting just before they were married in case there was a first child out of wedlock) for all children born to a father of Thomas Johnson, yields the following list.

- 1802 Oct 24 Thomas Johnson Cliprogarth a Son John
- 1804 May 2 Thomas Johnson Cliprogarth a daughter Mary (this one is written on the end
  of the list of 1804, after all the December entries, it could be an infant who died young,
  or a recording error.)
- 1805 May 10 Thomas Johnson Cliprogarth a daughter Mary
- 1808 July 15 Thomas Johnson Cliprogarth a daughter Jean Barbara
- 1808 July 15 Thomas Johnson Cliprogarth a daughter Elizabeth
- 1814 Feb 17 Thomas Johnson Cliprogarth a daughter Margaret
- 1818 Aug 23 Thomas Johnston Gardie a Son William born 20 Aug
- 1819 Nov 1 Thomas Johnson Midyell a daughter Ann
- 1820 May 14 Thomas Johnson Haroldswick a Son Thomas born 7 May
- · 1822 Sep 1 Thomas Johnston Skaw a Son John born 11 Aug

Clearly these are not all the same father, however, the first five children (with Mary recorded twice) all born to a Thomas Johnson of Cliprogarth look very likely to be siblings.

To double-check sibling-ship, we need to find the death records for those who died after 1855.

- Mary Thomason we found already, died in Unst on 10 July 1877. Her death record confirms both parents.
- Elizabeth Thomason died in Unst on 17 May 1899. Her death record confirms both parents.
- Jean Thomason is living with her twin sister in the 1861 census, and the relationship recorded confirms her as Elizabeth's sister.
- Margaret Thomson died in Unst on 18 December 1884. Her death record confirms both parents.

Confirmation of the parentage of all the sisters, who died after 1855, and the high likelihood that all the children born to Thomas Johnson of Cliprogarth are siblings, leaves me in no doubt that John Thomason was the son of Thomas Johnson and Ann Williamson as well.

Finally we must ask, could there be any other John Thomason born around the same time who is the man married to Barbara Jane Winwick? All we really know of John is from the 1841 census return where his age (which will have been rounded down) is given as 40.


Looking through the Unst Old Parish Baptism Records from 1795 until 1805 for all children called John, yielded a list of 46 Johns. It is unknown when looking at such entries, what surname the child will use in future records, as patronymic surnames were still very much in use at this time and the OPR entry only records the child's given name (regardless of how some genealogy websites choose to transcribe it!). Considering both surname forms, we end up with the following list of John's to follow-up on.

Here's what we know about the above John's.

- John Thom[p]son, son of George Thom[p]son, lived and died in Bighton and married Ann Spence Trail. He is not the John we are looking for.
- John Miller, son of Thomas Miller, lived and died in Petister and married Catherine Thomson. He is not the John we are looking for.
- John Thomson, son of Laurence Thomson, married Margaret Mathewson. He is not the John we are looking for.
- John Harrison, son of Thomas Harrison & Ursula Williamson, was a mariner, lived outside of Shetland, and married Margaret and Sarah. He is not the John we are looking for.
- I don't know anything about John son of Thomas Anderson, but the other children born to Thomas Anderson of Cliff used the surname Anderson, so I don't believe he is the John we are looking for.

Through a process of elimination, we can therefore confidently say that John Thomason, son of Thomas Johnson of Cliprogarth, is the same man that married Barbara Jane Winwick. There is no other man it could be.

#### Searching for all children

- You can also use Scotland's People to search for more than one child's birth record at once. We can make some changes to our search from before to look for John Hughson AND all his siblings.
- We'll remove the first name, select both genders, and widen the date range, and perhaps if we have confidence from our census findings, select only one parish, in this case "Unst".

#### All Children Results

- This search returns a number of records. Sorting the result by clicking on the Date column heading helps to see them in birth order.
- The results show me five children born to James Hughson in Unst. I however know from census records that there are actually seven children. How come Joanna, who was born about 1849, and Mary who was born about 1854 (after her sibling and namesake died young) are not shown in the results?



- Reasons for defects and gaps
  - No standard format
  - Registration not compulsory
  - Some session clerks/ministers not so good at recording
  - Some dissenters objected to being registered by the Established Church
  - Between 1783-1794 fee of three pence to register (£1 in today's money)
     (with fine of five pounds if you failed to register) (£384 in today's money)
  - Rapid Urbanisation (as mentioned earlier)
  - Damage to volumes (damp, rodents, fire)
- Check the published dates for your parish
  - That's not always the whole story though

#### Gaps in Old Parish Records

- There are many reasons for gaps to be found in Old Parish Records. Some are as a result of the record never having been written, and some are as a result of the records being destroyed some time after having been written.
- National Records for Scotland provides a list of the years covered for each parish –

- · In the case of the parish we are looking at today, Unst in Shetland, it reports:-
  - B: 1776 1820: 1820 1854
  - M: 1797 1819; 1819 1854
  - D: 1883 1854
- However, when you view all the pages you actually discover that there is a gap between late 1849 – 1854. This gaps covers the two missing siblings I was looking for.



- Next we are going to look for his marriage record to his wife Jemima. We know her first name from the census records, and we know that they married at some point between 1861 and 1871 due to her appearance in the 1871 census.

# N O T E

#### Results

- Amazingly, there is only one possible result of a John Hughson marrying a Jemima in that decade, in the entirety of Scotland! I think it is the "Hughson" that is the less common name in this.
- Of course, with two names to search for, you will in general find less hits than when looking for one name for a birth or death record.
- The index record is a little bit lean. We have both parties full names, and a year, but not even a complete date.
- Let's compare the record that we purchase with the index.
- In addition to the date and place of the marriage; you also get the occupation and marital status of the two parties (and if they were german cousins Ist cousins this will also be noted); you get their ages and usual residence; and you get both their parents names, mothers maiden name, and father's occupation. If any of the parents are deceased, this will also be noted.
- Note, that in England, it is only is very recent years that mother's name is even on marriage records. In fact when I married in 2015, it still wasn't!
- I think we can all agree that this record is worth the purchase price!



- Statutory Records contain more information than OPRs
- Also, the more people involved, the more valuable the record
  - E.g. Marriage Record = 2 people = 2 x value!


- The difference that we have seen here is illustrative of the difference between Old Parish Records and Statutory Records.
- As a general rule, Statutory records have more information than OPRs, and the more people involved, the more valuable the record as well.
- It is the subject of a whole other presentation, looking in detail at these differences and deciding which records are worth purchasing from Scotland's People and which you can find transcriptions of elsewhere to save your money. The summary from that presentation is shown here.

- The best place to start with your UK Ancestors
- Transcriptions of 1841-1901 Scottish census are available on Ancestry & FMP
  - Good enough
  - Not worth buying the images from Scotland's People (more in a moment)
- 1911 census
  - Not transcribed by Ancestry or FMP
  - Only place to get the information is Scotland's People
- As an aside get to know the parish your ancestor is from with maps from the National Library of Scotland – Extra reading material

#### Census

- When researching your Scottish Ancestors, the best place to start is census records. Census records allow you to understand the familial relationships, and build a good picture of the family; husband, wife, children, perhaps elderly parents. Census records will give you an approximate birth year since the ages of people are recorded. You also can discover a starting point for searching for marriage dates if you find a married couple in one census decade, when they were not married in the previous decade.
- Both Ancestry and Find My Past have adequate transcriptions of Scottish census records, which you can access for free through your library. There is little need to use Scotland's People website to look at the images of census records from 1841 – 1901.
- The same cannot be said for the 1911 census. There are still no transcriptions for this decade available on the major subscription websites, and so your only access to this data is to use Scotland's People.
- We're going to search for John and his wife Jemima in the 1911 census in a moment.

#### Old Maps

Although I lived on Unst from birth and through my teenage years, and although my father and his father before him were postmen on Unst, I don't recognise all the house names that I find when working through the old census records. Helpfully, the houses are recorded in areas so the neighbouring houses are next to each other on the census returns.

I found a great site on the web which provides online, zoom-able maps from way back. The specific ones I've been using are the

Ordnance Survey Maps – 25 inch 1st edition, Scotland, 1855-1882. Easiest way to start is to use the graphic index to work out what page you want and then open it from the list directly.

This a photo of the area that the map below shows. It shows the house I grew up in, in the foreground. I've tried to indicate the direction in which the photo was taken on the map. Click on the map to go straight to the zoom-able version on the NLS website.



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## Census (1851 – 1901)

Let's take a quick look at census records. These are one of the mainstays of your Scottish research. You have census returns from the years 1841 through to 1911 at the moment. Transcriptions of 1841 – 1901 census returns are available on Ancestry and Find My Past and therefore free for you to look at through your local library. For the most part these transcriptions are fairly complete and you can avoid going to Scotland's People for them. To illustrate, let's look at an 1861 census image from Scotland's People and compare it to the transcriptions that both Ancestry and Find My Past have for the same.



- You may notice one a few columns are missing from the transcription on Ancestry, and perhaps the most useful of these to a genealogist is the marital status. As you can see the FMP transcription is better and has the marital status transcribed.
- Most of the time this will be obvious though, with the relation to the head of the household identifying the Wife and Children with the same name being unmarried. Where it can sometimes be useful is with parents-in-law being widowed. If you are struggling to find a death date for a spouse you might look for their census records to get a 10 year bracket.





## Census (1841)

- You may have noticed in your use of Scottish census records that there is less information in the transcriptions of the 1841 census than of the others. This in fact is the most accurately transcribed census. There simply is less information in the 1841 census than in others. It is almost never worth purchasing the census image for 1841 over and above what you get from the transcriptions (unless you don't believe they have transcribed it correctly of course).
- One thing to note, when the transcription says they were born in "Orkney and Shetland", this is conveying the Y/N in the column "Born in County". If they were born outside of the parish, you wouldn't be told where they were born. Ancestry correctly shows "Orkney and Shetland" whereas Find My Past just shows "Shetland" perhaps unaware that in the 1841 census, Orkney and Shetland were all considered one county.

#### Fill in Search Criteria

- It is generally easier to search one census year at a time, mainly because you have to supply the age you expect them to be on the census. If you select multiple census years, the age range you have to input wouldn't be as useful.
- On all previous census, John's age has been quite consistent, so he clearly knows when he was born and isn't trying to hide anything from the enumerators, so I fully expect if I can find him in 1911 he will be recorded as being aged 73. However, I will still widen the age range a bit regardless.
- Again, I fully expect that if I find him, he will be living in Unst, where he has lived his whole life. However, I'll start my search with the whole county of Shetland, just in case he has moved in his old age, say to live with one of his children.

- When you are looking at your results in Scotland's People, the search criteria you use are shown in the side bar. This allows you to make quick tweaks to the search very easily to update the result.
- We're going to change them to look for Jemima, with the same age range. We'll also remember to change the gender.

# Results • We got one re


- We got one result. This is possibly the most difficult decision in terms of "is it worth it?". The index shows little more than I told it! We have found a woman with an appropriate name and age living in the parish we expected. We don't get the house name in the index, so can't compare it to the previous decade to see if it is likely. We just have to take a punt.
- The household that Jemima is in, is a busy one. She is recorded as Head of the household, and 4 of her adult children also live there, along with 6 of her grand-children. These names line up with what we know from previous census records and confirm that this is the correct person.
- The one really important fact that we get from this census record though, that might make it worth the credits, is that Jemima is recorded as Widowed. So now we know why we can't find John. Time to search the death records.





#### Results

- Again, we got one result clearly the name John Hughson is more unique than I gave it credit for! This time though, I have no qualms in recommending that you spend credits to buy this record – especially for a person who was born before 1855 and for which you may not yet know the mothers name.
- There is a lot of information in a death record, far more than the index gives you, although you do get the year of death from index, which may be all some people are after.
- You get the full date and location of death; spouse's name; parents names and occupation of father and maiden surname of mother; cause of death; and then sometimes you will get an extra gem of information in the informant box since it is often a relative, you might be able to make another link or two on the family tree as a result.

#### Searching using Scotland's People

- In this presentation we have looked in detail at how to use the search facilities of the Scotland's People website. We recommend that you use this website once you have found out a little about your ancestors using census transcriptions that are available on the subscription websites such as Ancestry and Find My Past (which are available for free at your local library).
- Scotland's People is a Pay-per-Record website, so you need to be choosy about what you spend your credits on. As a general rule, statutory records provide a higher value of information than the Old Parish Records.
- When searching, keep in mind that you need to know whether you are looking for something in the pre-1855 or post-1855 era in order to search the correct collection.
